

2nd WFNS Global Neurosurgery Conference and 1st ISGNS Conference**Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, 11th-18th April 2026**

I had the privilege of attending this conference from 15th to 18th April, which unfortunately coincided with the SBNS Harrogate meeting.

The 1st WFNS Global Neurosurgery Conference was in Peshawar, Pakistan, in February 2024. The current meeting was organised jointly between the WFNS Global Neurosurgery committee, chaired by Tariq Khan, and the Tanzanian Neurosurgical Society, with Hamisi Shabani as chair of the local organising committee.

The theme of the joint conference was '*Global neurosurgery impact and challenges in LMICs: uniting minds and transforming care.*' The main meeting was preceded by a number of educational, training, and public engagement events, beginning on Saturday 11th April. The conference ended with the formal launch of the International Society for Global Neurosurgery (ISGNS), and the election of the various office bearers.

Chaired by Gail Rousseau, multiple speakers with rapid fire updates on their Boston declaration pledges, covering the full spectrum of global neurosurgery.

Main conference

Thursday 16th April

Opening ceremony

This was attended by the President of Tanzania, Dr Samia Suluhu Hassan. Packed auditorium, excellent public engagement and a high profile event.

Programme

The first day included keynote speeches from Kee Park, Tariq Khan, Tony Figaji, and Gail Rousseau. The theme of the day was advocacy.

Friday 17th April

Programme

The theme was leadership and partnerships, moving on to research and training as the day progressed. Again, very high quality speakers: Moody Qureshi, Alex Golby, and Graham Fieggen (plus many more). There were some useful panel discussions in the afternoon (chaired by Beverley Cheserem) with audience engagement.

Saturday 18th April

Programme

A short lecture session to start the day.

Election of ISGNS board

This was the main focus of the final day. The election process was overseen by Dr Richard Moser, ably assisted by Jay Rav and others.

The electorate was ordinary members of the ISGNS who were present in person, and who had paid their dues. The fee was a nominal \$10 (plus \$2.51 to Eventbrite).

Individuals could nominate themselves or another, with the nominations closing at 0900 on the morning of the election.

For each post the electorate queued and voted one by one for each of the positions from among the available nominees.

The final 8th board position, normally allocated to the past president, was filled by Tariq Khan, having been proposed and then confirmed by a show of hands.

Summary/Observations

Attending this meeting allowed an overview of the origins of Global Neurosurgery, how it has developed, and where it is likely to go in the future. A large number of partnerships exist, often direct between institutions (HIC-LMIC), many of which are still active. It's interesting that some of the collaborations began with the provision of direct clinical care in LMICs, with the realisation that such a strategy could not be scaled, before moving on to education, training, research and advocacy.

The practice of Global Neurosurgery might therefore be usefully summarised by the acronym TREAT:

- Treatment (delivered by local neurosurgeons, rather than short term visits)
- Research
- Education
- Advocacy
- Training

We are already involved in all these areas through the SBNS Global Neurosurgery Initiative. There are also many neurosurgeons in the UK who engage with Global Neurosurgery, mostly through education and training. We may have an advantage in that we have a strong single voice through the SBNS, whereas there appears to be less co-ordination between the various institutions and organisations in other high income countries, despite the excellent projects and partnerships which have often resulted.

WFNS/ISGNS relationship

This meeting was a joint conference between the WFNS and ISGNS. The ISGNS is a completely independent society, with its legal entity in Delaware.

Possible joint SBNS/ISGNS meeting

The plan is to have an ISGNS conference biannually, with the 2028 conference to be held in Bogota, Colombia, in 2028. However, there appears to be opportunity in the alternate years, including 2027. A joint SBNS/ISGNS meeting at some point, if possible, would be an exciting prospect.
